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WORLD SCOUTING QUIZ BOOK INTRODUCTION

"You are now a member of the world wide Brotherhood of Scouts".

That is the phrase I hope you use during the investiture of a Scout or Cub, and, having said it, the question arises, "What do you do about it?" What, in fact can you do to give a young Scout, or a Cub for that matter, an understanding of the size and strength of the brotherhood of which he is a member? How much do you know about World Scouting; how it is run; the relative strength of one country compared to another; how it differs because of race or creed or – most probably – climate? Do you know what different Scouts wear and the design of the flag they honour? Possibly you don't know very much about these things and so it is not easy for you to do anything in a practical way about carrying world wide brotherhood into action and making it interesting and alive.

I hope this small Quiz Book will give you some information for yourself and that you will use it and adapt it so that you can put over a more vivid picture to your Troop. I hope also that it will stimulate you to want to find out more about World Scouting.

How to use the book? For heaven's sake, don't read it all out at once and expect the Troop to give you the answers. Perhaps it is better used as: –

- 1) the basis for yarns,
- 2) the basis for items interjected into the Patrol competition you run,
- 3) a stimulus to your imagination to devise practical activities that you can offer to the Troop.

You will see that I have grouped the questions into sections and I have tried to give them a rating as to whether I think they are difficult, moderately difficult, or easy. You ought at least to be able to answer the easy ones without much reference, but I realise that for the hard ones you will have to do a little searching, and it is out of searching that the benefit should accrue.

The ratings are: A. Fairly easy: 1 point for each correct answer.

- B. Getting harder: 2 points for each correct answer.
- C. Hard and perhaps tricky: 3 points for each correct answer.
- D. If you know the answer to these you are pretty good:5 points for each correct answer.

One of the great problems in compiling a Quiz Book is to try to make certain that when the manuscript is released the answers are correct. I have taken a great deal of care and two experts in the international field have checked the manuscript, but the fact remains that we live in a changing world and Scouting, being a Movement, inevitably changes also. I think I can say with certainty that the questions are appropriate but as the months and years go by some of the answers will need changing. Perhaps a country will have changed its flag. (Between the first draft of the book and the second draft Tanganyika became independent and produced a new flag. Incidentally, I wonder if you know what it is.) This kind of thing is liable to happen. The questions relating to the number of Scouts I sincerely hope will change because I hope the Movement is growing all the time. The questions relating to living people are liable to change, and perhaps a country may decide to alter the Scout uniform, which they are entitled to do if they wish.

There it is, then. I can guarantee the questions and at the time they leave me the answers also. I hope that through your reading of "The Scouter" and by discussing World Scouting with others you will keep your knowledge up to date and use this Quiz Book as a stimulant.

Finally, I would say this: A World wide brotherhood that does not trouble to find out how the other half of the world is living or in a Scouting sense is being run can never be as effective as a world brotherhood that stems from knowledge, which alone in my estimation can breed understanding. By all means have a go at answering the questions yourself and try to resist the temptation to turn immediately to the answers. I would not expect anyone to get all the answers right: I assure you that I could not have done so without looking up many things, but unless you can get 25 per cent right without reference to anything at all I think your knowledge as a Leader in the Movement of which you are a member is too slight and you ought to be doing something to remedy your deficiency.

UNIFORM

A great many Scouts in other countries wear as part of their uniform what is in fact part of the traditional national costume. Sometimes it is adapted; sometimes they wear it abroad and not very often at home. Scouting has always encouraged this kind of thing, partly because it is colourful and appropriate but essentially – and I know this from my travelling – because so often the national costume is more appropriate to the climate than is the original uniform.

So here we go with a few questions on uniform: – If you saw a Scout wearing the item of uniform mentioned, from which country would you think he originated? (Assuming he has not been engaged in a swopping match at a Jamboree).

- 1. A tartan kilt
- 2. A plain green kilt
- 3. A saffron coloured kilt
- 4. A close-fitting sky-blue skull cap quartered with white stripes
- 5. A lovat green field service cap
- 6. A dark blue field service cap
- 7. A lava-lava. (This is a garment that resembles a fairly close-fitting light-coloured skirt with a serrated edge.)
- 8. A lap-lap. (A type of loin cloth)
- 9. A traditional stetson-type Scout hat with the hat band made of zebra skin.
- 10. A Scout hat with the brim deliberately wavy. (I don't know how you decide about this!)
- 11. A black skull cap with a red and white Scout Badge on the front.
- 12. A black and red striped hat with a bobble on the top, worn rather like a Dickensian night cap.
- 13. A fore and aft type of hat made from astrakhan. (This is a jinnah cap.)
- 14. A turban or pugaree
- 15. Shorts with a turn-up sewn in
- 16. A bright red jacket
- 17. A black beret
- 18. A traditional pattern Scout hat in lightweight straw with a bound edge.
- 19. A Russian Cossack type hat
- 20. Bedouin type head dress
- 21. Leiderhosen made of soft mouse-grey leather
- 22. A whole contingent dressed in green shirts and blue serge shorts.
- 23. A contingent wearing hat bands made of fur
- 24. All green uniform with a khaki coloured traditional pattern Scout hat.
- 25. A conical plaited straw hat

You might like to follow up these question's by listing other countries which I have not referred to and seeing if you know – and if you don't know, trying to find out – what uniform they wear. It is rather complicated because in countries with extreme climates, such as Canada and Finland, what they wear in Summer is not the same as their Winter wear.

FLAGS

One of the things I think all Scouts should learn to do is to recognise the national flags of other countries, and I commend to you the Book on Flags in the Observer series which is admirable and, for five shillings, very good value. If you want something more comprehensive and elaborate, Messrs. Methuen publish a Handbook of Flags for sixteen shillings. The Observer Series also publish coloured pictures of flags on cards which sell at two shillings and sixpence for a packet of thirty-two and these are ideal for games or display on the walls of the Troop room.

Here are some questions on flags, a few of which I know are very difficult: -
